INTRODUCTION

In the baseball coaching world it is understood that in order for your team to be successful your defense must be solid “up the middle,” meaning your best defensive players should be positioned in centerfield, shortstop and at catcher.

With that said, out of those players “up the middle,” catchers are considered by many coaches as the most important player on the field. They are expected to be an extra coach and leader while also needing to possess nearly every important physical characteristic of all the other players on the field.

Even with the understanding that they are the most important player on the field; catchers are often neglected during practice. This is due to the fact that catching coaches are very rare. While most teams have a hitting coach, a pitching coach and even a fielding coach, many don't have a catching coach on staff. During defensive practice time, catchers are often sent to the bullpen to catch the pitchers or go to the bullpen to practice drills by themselves. All other positions typically have their position coaches with them during workouts.

This book was written to help those teams that may not have the luxury of having a catching coach. Chapter one explains in detail the characteristics needed to be a successful catcher. Chapters two through 10 give detailed descriptions of the fundamental skills involved with the position of catcher. Included in these chapters are fifty drills that may be utilized for skill improvement. Chapter 11 provides information that will help catchers better understand the mechanics of pitching, the psychological aspect of pitchers and the strengths and weaknesses of hitters.

Also included in the book are a Catcher Evaluation Chart, a Practice Drill List and a Pitching Strategy Chart. These are provided to help coaches evaluate the talent of their catchers, organize the catchers defensive practice time and help catchers understand hitter's tendencies which can be used to help set the hitters up for failure.

Whether you're a catcher trying to maximize your potential or a coach that is not familiar with the position, use this book to help improve your team's success by solidifying your defense “up the middle.”

Philadelphia Phillies organization.

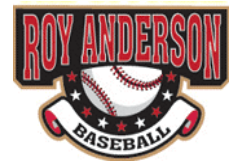
